Some information about Ann Jennison's trial was carried in the 22 April 1817 edition of the Hull Packet.

At the General Quarter Sessions for this town and county, on Thursday, *Ann Jennison*, for stealing thirteen handkerchiefs from Mr. King, linen-draper, pleaded *guilty*, and was sentenced to be transported for seven years. In her house a quantity of stolen goods, and forty-eight duplicates for property, a great part of which had been stolen was found.¹

Judging by the ill-gotten gains found in her house, together with the 48 pawn tickets, Ann Jennison seems to have made something of career of thieving. The *Hull Packet* also reported in May on the transfer of some female convicts, then held in gaols in York, to the convict vessel *Friendship*, but Ann Jennison is not included in the list.² But it would have been around late May that she too made the uncomfortable journey south to Deptford. She was leaving behind a husband, Henry, and possibly, but not mentioned, children.

Tentatively, Henry Jennison may have been the man who, on 18 November 1811 at the Holy Trinity Church, Hull, married Ann Bigby. Henry, a bachelor, was a cordwainer by trade; Ann was a spinster; both were 'of this parish'.

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Again speculatively, but with reference to Ann Jennison's estimated birth year, Ann Bigby may have been the daughter of George and Ann Bigby who was baptised at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Hull, on 12 September 1793.4


To return to 'firmer' ground. Aged 24 and a straw hat maker by trade, Ann Jennison arrived at Port Jackson on 14 January 1818, 'armed' with a scathing character reference from the ship's surgeon Peter Cosgreave. Not only was she deemed a prostitute, fraternising with the crew, but, unless she was pregnant when she boarded the ship, she also managed to become pregnant on the voyage and miscarried or possibly aborted the child. On arrival she was sent on to Van Diemen's Land, but in August 1819 she was on her way back to Port Jackson on board the colonial brig *Prince Leopold.* According to newspaper reports, the brig had on board several prisoners

under sentence to Newcastle; and one for trial on charges of sheep-stealing.⁶ The Tasmanian Name Index departures lists Ann as holding a ticket of leave but there is no indication as to why she was a passenger on the brig.⁷ Nor was she included in the Colonial Secretary's correspondence relating to the matter. Perhaps she was travelling as an assigned servant to one of the passengers?

There are three 'accounts' of Ann's whereabouts for 1820 – as a single woman mustered in Sydney; mustered at Hobart; and included in the 1820 Hobart Town Population muster.8 It was as a single woman that she was again mustered in 1821 at Sydney.9 She was back in Hobart for the 1823 muster for which she was listed as a servant to Z. [Zachariah] Chaffey, whose family had relocated from Norfolk Island in 1808.10

As noted above, Ann Jennison was given a ticket of leave by 1819. She was granted her certificate of freedom on 17 April 1824.¹¹




From the Register we gain some idea of what she looked like. She was 5' 1" inch tall, with a fair-ruddy complexion, brown hair and hazel eyes. 12 For the short time Ann was in Van Diemen's Land she did nothing to merit a mention on her conduct record. 13




Having obtained permission to leave the Island, Ann travelled to Port Jackson in February 1824, listed as a passenger on the brig *Belinda*.¹⁴

Ship News.—On Monday last arrived from England and Hobart Town, the brig Belinda, Captain Coverdale. This vessel, it may be recollected, made the latter Port some few months back, in a dismasted and otherwise wrecked condition. Her cargo comprises sundries. Passengers, from England and Hobart Town, Mr. Edward Lee. Supercargo; Mr. Edward Spark and family; Mr. Crook, Mr. J. Harpur, Mr. Wm. Lundin, Mr. James Kiernan, Miss Mary Hosking, Master W. Hutchinson, and Ann Jamieson and child.

The child listed with her on the passenger list was her's – son Thomas – who had been born Hobart on 19 March 1823 and baptised the following month on 15 April. The father of this child remains a mystery. 15



There are two records for Ann Jennison/Jamieson for the 1825 General Muster. 16



The first has her as Ann Jennison, living in Sydney and designated single. The second has her as Ann Jamieson, living in Sydney, the wife of Hy Jamieson, and the mother of Thomas Jamieson.

And it is at this point that the trail for Ann Jennison runs cold. Neither she nor Thomas have been found in the 1828 NSW Census, nor in any of the Tasmanian records.
